Children and staff are very excited about Pepper - our school dog - joining us next week (05/03/2020). As stated in last week's newsletter, she will have a phased introduction into the school and will spend the majority of her first few weeks based solely around Mr Tucker's office and the Admin office. Studies have shown that the presence of companion animals can improve the well-being of children and lower the rate of anxiety, simply by making the environment happier, more enjoyable and less forbidding.

This week pupils in Key Stage 2 were visited by Rosie Ellis from our local Dogs Trust centre in Harefield. She taught the children how to be Dog Smart:





- 1. Be Calm
- 2. Give an animal space
- 3. Play fairly
- 4. Don't disturb a dog
- 5. Keep your hands away
- 6. Remember that we respect and behave kindly around animals.

The school has a comprehensive policy and control measures which are expanded upon in the School Dog policy (available on the school website).

It is accepted that interacting with animals is not appropriate for all children but that for some it has the potential to provide many positive benefits. Any parent who does not wish their child to interact with the dog is invited to write to inform Mr Tucker of their wishes – stating whether the reason is due to allergies or a specific phobia or anxiety.

This week Ryefield pupils have been involved in many successes! The highlights are as follows:

Urban Debating League

After our success in Round 1 (5 out of 8 wins) the school has qualified for Round 2 - which gives our children the chance to visit a University campus! Further to this we were delighted to know that Ryefield is also ranked as one of the Top 50 schools in the country for debating!

Road Safety

Our pupil Road Safety Officers (JRSOs and MRSOs) were successful in securing a £500 grant from the local authority. This money will go towards banners and signage to prevent drivers from parking and dropping off on the white zig-zag lines which are located at the front of the school. One of the local councillors was so impressed with our proposal he also gave us additional funding to support the school in providing First Aid training for pupils.

TAG Rugby

Mrs Donoghue took a selected group of pupils from Lower Key Stage 2 to attend a local TAG Rugby festival and we were delighted to come away victorious. These children will now be part of a larger event which will be held in March. Congratulations - they have clearly been inspired by the England team's recent performance.





TikTok is a video-sharing social media app available on iOS and Android which lets users create, share, and view user created videos much in a similar manner to Facebook, Instagram and Snapchat. Estimates suggest that it now has anything between 500 million and over 1 billion monthly active users worldwide.

ONLINE PREDATORS

As a social network, TikTok makes it easy to connect with other users. This includes the ability to comment on and react to other users videos, follow their profile and download their content. Be aware that by default, any user can comment on your child's video if their account is set to public. Most interactions are harmless enough but as an app, TikTok is prone to predators because of the abundance of younger users.
