# End of Term and beyond

The past two terms have been surreal. As the pandemic thundered across the globe, February and early March felt as if one was in a Hollywood film. There was a sense that something was coming, but no-one seemed to know exactly what that was. Then – with 48 hours' notice – schools closed. As a society we had to adapt and adjust; where we wanted to come together for comfort, we had to stay away for our safety.



Yet there was a sliver of normality that calmed the maelstrom of emotions and anxieties which seemed to wrap itself around the first few weeks of lockdown: Key Worker and Vulnerable Provision (KWVP).

The staff at Ryefield embraced the new normal, providing outstanding provision for our young students. We were united in giving these children (whose parents were working on the front line) a joyous and enriching experience. Over the past 100 days, we've fallen in love with snails, harvested crops from our allotment, learnt how to play the drums, discovered new artists, and made new friends. Ryefield will seek to include aspects of the KWVP provision into our recovery curriculum, and look ahead to September with a sense of optimism and hope. I am so proud of Ryefield's amazing staff. They have – despite the negative press teachers received in the past few months – never wavered in their dedication to providing quality first teaching to the students who were either on site, or at home. September will bring its own set of challenges and surprises, I know that we will be redoubling our efforts to:

- To accelerate progress;
- To improve core skills;
- To develop resilient pupils.

# Uniform

We would also like to remind parents that - **for the autumn term** - the school has made school uniform non-compulsory. We would prefer children to come to school wearing a fresh set of clean clothes everyday. On the days they have PE, children can come to school in a tracksuit/set of joggers and sweat top, thus removing the need to change in class.

No child will be penalised for wearing a uniform, and some parents may want to mix and match depending on the weather. The governing body will make a decision in October that will determine whether the compulsory wearing of uniform will be reintroduced for the spring term (January onwards).



#### **Equipment** for school



Pupils will be limited to certain equipment and September's equipment list is as follows:

1. A clear, sturdy, zippable plastic wallet (click here to see a recommended style) with your child's name written on it.

2. A named water bottle

3. Reading Record and Homework books (provided by the school)

4. Reading book (from school and/or free choice)

5. Pencil case which needs to contain HB pencils, **BLUE** writing pen (<u>friction pens are best</u>), an eraser, a sharpener, highlighter,

glue stick and either colouring pencils or crayola twistable. NO FELT TIPS

6. Packed Lunch box (hot dinners will be made available at a later date in the autumn term.

## Year 6 End of Year Show: His Dark Materials / Northern Lights




