School Uniform

Dear parents and carers,

During lockdown, and part of the phased reopening to school, the school's governing body decided to allow children to come to school in their own clothes. The governing body of the school met earlier this week to consider the reinstating of the school uniform. It was decided that from the spring term the school will reintroduce uniforms, as they play a key part in moving towards the normality and routines that your child will have been previously familiar with.

Therefore from **Tuesday 5 January 2021**, we will expect all children to return to school in their full uniform.

Boys and girls wear:

- A white polo shirt
- School jumper/cardigan
- Grey trousers, skirt or pinafore
- White socks
- Black formal school shoes (no trainers)

In the summer, girls can wear a light summer dress.

In Year 5 & 6 pupils must wear a white shirt with a school tie. Ties can be bought on Parent Pay for £4.10 each, every Friday a member of staff will deliver the ties to the classrooms.

The only exception to this rule will be on the days that your child has P.E. They will be required to come to school in clothing that is suitable for P.E., ideally trainers, tracksuit bottoms, t-shirt and a hoodie or sweater, as your child may well be enjoying outdoor PE in the bracing weather associated with January and February.

Map Reading KS2 Knowledge Mat


Knowledge Organisers:



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Hot Lunches

The school's expansion of its hot meal service, dubbed 'DeliveRye' continues to be a success with pupils. We are expanding the hot meal options to include pasta pots, pizza with garlic bread, and we are pleased to introduce a Friday favourite: **fish and chips**!

The school kitchen is providing packed lunches for all pupils who are eligible for free school meals, this includes children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2. They **must** be ordered in advance and via Parent Pay. We have had a number of children expecting lunch but their parents have not ordered a sandwich pack/hot meal option. **Please note that we are only allowing families to make menu choices three weeks in advance.** This enables us to ensure that we can easily upload more hot menu choices, such as hot dogs and potato wedges.

We have limited spaces in our after school clubs. Bike Ability has completely sold out and we cannot wait to see the amazing progress our children will make as the coaches teach them how to ride a bike without stabilisers. The booking window remains open so it's not too late to secure a place. However, should you change your mind refunds will only be given if the school is able to secure a replacement for your child's place.
